

## Promoting British Values at Barlestone Primary School -2021-2022

The DfE have reinforced the need ***“to create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all schools to promote the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.”***

The government set out its definition of British values in the 2011 Prevent Strategy, and these values have been reiterated by the Prime Minister and Government. At Barlestone School these values are reinforced regularly and in the following ways:



### Democracy:

Democracy is evident within the school. Pupils have the opportunity to have their voices heard through our Junior Leadership Team and Pupil questionnaires. The elections of Junior Leadership reps are based solely on pupil votes. Our school behaviour policy involves rewards which the pupils vote on as a class group.

### The Rule of Law:

The importance of Laws, whether they be those that govern the class, the school, or the country, are consistently reinforced throughout regular school days, as well as when dealing with behaviour and through school assemblies. Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind

laws, that they govern and protect us, the responsibilities that this involves and the consequences when laws are broken. Visits from authorities such as the Police and Fire Service help reinforce this message.

### **Individual Liberty:**

Within school, pupils are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment. As a school we educate and provide boundaries for young pupils to make choices safely, through of provision of a safe environment and empowering education. Pupils are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and advise how to exercise these safely, for example through our E-Safety and PSHE lessons. Whether it be through choice of challenge, of how they record, of participation in our numerous extra-curricular clubs and opportunities, pupils are given the freedom to make choices.

### **Mutual Respect:**

Part of our school ethos and behaviour policy has revolved around Core Values such as 'Respect', and pupils have been part of discussions and assemblies related to what this means and how it is shown. Posters around the school promote respect for others and this is reiterated through our classroom and learning rules, as well as our behaviour policy.

### **Tolerance of those of Different Faiths and Beliefs:**

This is achieved through enhancing pupils understanding of their place in a culturally diverse society and by giving them opportunities to experience such diversity. Assemblies and discussions involving prejudices and prejudice-based bullying have been followed and supported by learning in RE and PSHE.

Science	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Rule of Law – Need to follow rules for Health and safety</li> <li>• Practical investigations follow conventions of science including giving credit where it is due and working as a team</li> <li>• Individual liberty to own views; tolerance and mutual respect to share views</li> <li>• Controversial issues: evolution vs. creation; genetic modification; selective breeding; animal testing</li> <li>• Exploring stereotypes of a scientist</li> </ul>
MFL and culture	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Actively promote the key values of mutual respect, diversity and plurality</li> <li>• Learning that different languages are spoken around the world and valued in communities</li> <li>• Global citizenship – what is happening in the world around us</li> <li>• Reflecting on ways of life in other cultures and embracing differences in contexts</li> </ul>

History	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Exploring democracy in historical contexts</li> <li>• Achievements of British and other people – developing an appreciation for their work</li> <li>• Study moral and ethical issues in the past and applying to modern day issues such as piracy, slavery, terrorism, human rights</li> </ul>
Geography	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Settlements and how communities develop over time</li> <li>• How societies are linked by common values</li> <li>• To appreciate diversity in local cultures and backgrounds</li> <li>• To discuss contemporary issues in society</li> </ul>
RE	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Children have the opportunity to learn about and explore different world faiths. They understand that not everyone shares the same beliefs and listen respectfully to the opinions of others.</li> <li>• Explore different cultural traditions amongst faith groups and think about the different ways in which people might celebrate, mark milestones and show positively their commitment.</li> <li>• Children are encouraged to ask the 'Big Questions'. A safe environment is provided for children to talk about issues, for example to consider what is meant by right and wrong.</li> <li>• Children learn about different religious and traditional festivals and explore the differences between the two concepts.</li> <li>• We welcome visitors of different faiths to celebrate diversity.</li> </ul>
PHSE	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Encourage discussion and debate – listening to the opinions of others and challenging in a constructive manner.</li> <li>• Developing self-esteem and self-awareness.</li> <li>• Giving children the skills and opportunities to practice difficult situations and scenarios.</li> <li>• Why rules are made and why we follow them.</li> <li>• When can rules be broken?</li> <li>• Route to Resilience accredited and teach children about their 'character muscles' to encourage independence and deeper thinking.</li> </ul>
